Funding also pays for one CCTV Camera that covers this area. ASB Hyper Local meetings continue – anything specific to go through Nicola The PSPO continues to provide powers to the City Council and the Police in issuing dispersal notices.	Hotspot policing funding ceases 31 March 2026, which covered additional police patrols and contribution to Community Safety Team. ASB lawyer is funded through a different funding stream and will continue until 2027, role is shared with Torquay. Lawyer is keen to be involved in ASB cases. Current ASB trend is youth.
